FFA Legislative Conference

Mohawk FFA members had the unique opportunity to visit the state capitol, immersing themselves in the legislative process and discovering career paths within government and public service. The experience provided valuable insight into how laws are made and the essential skills needed to work in various roles within the capitol.

During their visit, members attended informative sessions. These sessions covered topics such as how a bill becomes law, the importance of agricultural policy, and the role of advocacy in shaping legislation. By engaging in these discussions, FFA members gained a deeper appreciation for the steps required to get laws passed and learned there is more information to be gained than they imagined. The value of listening and seeing other perspectives became clearer.

In addition to learning about the legislative process, students explored the wide array of career opportunities available at the capitol. From legislative aides and policy analysts to communication specialists and legal advisors, members discovered the diverse skill sets required to support the functions of government. Many students were particularly intrigued by the prospect of internships and mentorship programs that could provide them with handson experience in state governance.

The visit also emphasized the importance of professional skills such as public speaking, networking, and critical thinking. Members had the chance to practice these skills firsthand during meetings with elected officials, where they presented their perspectives on key agricultural issues and asked insightful questions about the legislative process.

For many FFA members, the trip to the state capitol was an eye-opening experience that reinforced their interest in leadership, policymaking, and advocacy. By engaging with lawmakers and professionals in the field, they left with a greater understanding of how they can influence positive change in their communities and beyond. As FFA continues to cultivate the next generation of leaders, opportunities like these serve as invaluable stepping stones toward meaningful and impactful careers.

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Mohawk Students Put Skills to the Test at Welding Certification Day

Springfield, OR – A group of Mohawk High School welding students recently took a major step toward their future careers at a welding certification event hosted by AirGas industry professionals at Springfield High School. The certification day offered

students a rare opportunity to showcase their skills in a high-stakes, real-world assessment environment.

Each student was given one chance to complete a certified horizontal T-weld, a challenging task even for seasoned welders. To earn certification, the weld had to pass a series of rigorous tests, including a visual inspection, end-cut acid etching to confirm root penetration at both ends, and a final bend test to assess the structural integrity of the main piece. "Cleaning and prepping the metal was critical," said Kelli Hedrick, welding instructor at Mohawk High School. "Students quickly learned that attention to detail in the early steps made all the difference in their final weld performance."

Congratulations to Maddox Jones on earning his GMAW D1 Structural Steel Certification. Maddox is in his first year of welding. We are very excited for him and his future. Although not every student earned certification, most who fell short missed it by a narrow margin, typically due to a slight gap in root penetration at one end of the weld. The experience was a powerful learning moment for all involved. "Getting this kind of real-time feedback from industry professionals is invaluable," said Kelli Hedrick. "The AirGas team not only tested our students, but worked side by side with them, offering coaching, technique tips, and encouragement throughout the day."

Students walked away with a deeper understanding of their personal welding styles, strengths, and areas for growth. More importantly, they gained confidence and first-hand exposure to industry expectations. Events like this reflect the growing strength of Mohawk's welding program and the vital role of industry partnerships in preparing students for success beyond high school.

Mohawk FFA's First State Officer

The Oregon FFA Association has multiple layers of leadership opportunities for members. Students in Marcola are able to start as part of the Greenhand leadership team and work their way to applying for a district office as high schoolers with many levels of experience in between. As a senior, they are given the opportunity to apply for 1 of only 6 state offices. The process of applying is rigorous. First they are required to completely update AET records with time spent in the Supervised Agriculture Experience project, Career

Development Events, awards, community service, time not related to FFA like sports, their resume, and more. They are required to write a candidate letter for all FFA'ers to read, complete an application with 7 different signatures, information pages, and more, and be subject to a thorough social media review. Interviews begin at state convention and as the days progress,

there are two rounds of cuts before making a top 10 list which is then voted on by the members of the FFA delegation. Interviews and speeches which focus on behavioral analysis, stakeholder engagement, problemsolving, interpersonal communication, and critical thinking. Long story short it is an intense process where



the elite individuals of merit and character rise to the top with a state office.

I'm so proud to introduce the 2025-2026 State FFA Treasurer Ethian Webb! Ethian made that climb and succeeded! As an FFA officer, he is committed to spending the next year of his life to the Oregon FFA. Oregon FFA's six elected State Officers spend a year traveling the state representing the organization and advancing agriculture education to both members and the public. This is no easy task, and is accomplished only with the utmost passion, diligence, and integrity. Collectively, they run workshops at all district leadership camps, visit every school in the state offering workshops of teacher choice, travel the state and engage agriculture business support and open opportunities for FFA members to learn about agriculture across our state and country.



Being a state officer has been Ethian's dream since he first joined FFA as a freshman. In addition to FFA, Ethian has volunteered at the fire station, participated in multiple sports, and competes on his horse in local gaming shows. Ethian is not forgoing his desire to attend college and pursue his career path in healthcare, just doing what he loves to do most - give back. Ethian stated in his candidacy letter, "FFA gave me a purpose greater than personal achievement. It showed me the power of teamwork, the value of mentorship, and the importance of fostering a community where everyone has the chance to thrive."

In 1911, the Coast Range Lumber Company purchased the Sunset Lumber Company at Mabel, Oregon. They spent 1911 and the early part of 1912 expanding their timber holdings in the area. In the summer of 1912, they built a new mill and constructed 4 miles of railroad up the Shotgun creek valley. Sixty-five men were used in the work.

Additionally they upgraded the community with electric lights and a gravity water system. The began constructing houses for their workmen and their families.

One of the biggest additions to the town was a fully-stocked "department store." At the time they expected to operate for 15 years. That estimate in 1911 proved prophetic when the company was sold in 1926 to a Chicago bank as part of a bankruptcy option.

This department store was one of three stores known to have operated in

Mabel over the years. The two men are unidentified at this time. In the image you can see many goods lining the walls, heads of cabbage in a bin, shaving strops, knives, teapots and miscellaneous other items. In the back left corner, you can see the Mabel post office.



You can see the post office boxes and the central window if you look close. This picture was taken in 1913.

My dad, Bernie Young, graduated from Mohawk High School in 1930. He then went to Albany College for two years. Albany College was later to become part of Oregon State College. It was referred to as "The Cow College" because their classes majored in agriculture.

After college, Dad then joined The Three C's and was their head accountant for the next few years during his middle twenties. He flew small planes back and forth to their main headquarters up in Vancouver, Washington, flying from the little Springfield Airport, where the Walmart Store is now located.

(Anybody remember that?)

During these years, Dad's mother, my Grandma Doris Young, and his two younger brothers, Bob and Casey Young, were still at home in Mabel. And they were all faithful to write letters often to Dad. He kept many of their letters and I now enjoy reading them and hearing their conversations with one another.

During his early adult years as a young man away from family and his familiar hometown of Mabel, Oregon, the family stayed in touch with their letter writing. These letters now are so precious to me. As I read through them, I get a glimpse of my dear ones as they went about living their ordinary, everyday lives.

After our dads married, they built their homes and lived beside each other on Wendling



I PLEDGE ALLEGIANCE By Juanita Paslay

I love to read historical information, and I believe now is an appropriate time to share what I learned recently. Our pledge to our flag and country endured six small improvements since it was revised in 1892 by Francis Bellamy, a Baptist minister. The first version was written in 1885 by Captain George Thatcher Balch, a Union Army officer.

Congress formally adopted this pledge in 1942.

As you read this, you may place your right hand over your thankful heart if you desire.

Official versions (*changes in bold italics*)

1892 "I pledge allegiance to my flag and the republic for which it stands: one nation indivisible with liberty and justice for all."

1892 to 1923 "I pledge allegiance to my flag and **to** the republic for which it stands: one nation indivisible with liberty and justice for all."

1923 to 1924 "I pledge allegiance to **the** flag **of the United States** and to the republic for which it stands: one nation indivisible with liberty and justice for all."

1924 to 1954 "I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States *of America*, and to the republic for which it stands; one nation indivisible with liberty and justice for all."

1954 to Present "I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America, and to the republic for which it stands, one nation *under God,* indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

There is much to remember about our war for independence from Great Britain. May I tempt you to pick up your old encyclopedia for a refresher course? Did you know smallpox and scurvy claimed more lives than the battle with the British?

New listings (556) increased 21.7% from the 457 listed in April 2024, and increased 35.3% from the 411 listed in March 2025.

Pending Sales

Pending sales (372) decreased 1.8% from the 379 offers accepted in April 2024, and decreased 2.4% from the 381 offers accepted in March 2025.

Closed Sales
